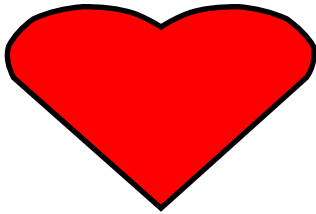

Remember the lottery is drawn every Saturday. You can follow the link on our website or go to yourschoollottery.co.uk and search for Woodstone.

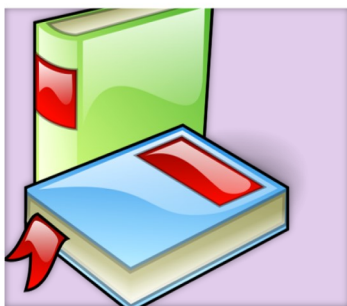

Loughborough University is offering an opportunity for adult members of the public to take part in a new health study called FOODS, which aims to help adults improve their eating habits and health, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic. The study is conducted entirely online and participants are asked to follow Twitter or Instagram for information about unhealthy snack foods (e.g. cakes, crisps & chocolate) to help them reflect on their food intake and reduce their consumption of high calorie foods.

After the study, you may be asked if you'd like to participate in an online telephone interview to give feedback



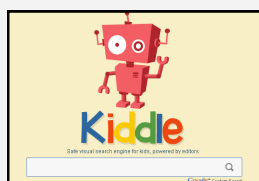

We'd like to remind you about the internet search engine which is specifically designed to keep children safe when they are searching online. The site is called **KIDDLE**.

Our Reception Class listened to Smartie the Penguin who'd had a new tablet for his birthday whilst children in Year 1 listened to the story of Detective Digiduck who helped them decide if things on the internet are true or not true. Many of our older classes used the BBC resources and videos.



And finally don't forget on our own website under the parent info tab there is an E Safety tab with lots of information and videos from CEOP all designed at keeping children safe online.

STRANGER DANGER

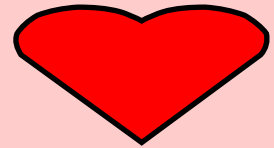

Did you know...the History of Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day is a time to celebrate love and friendship and the joy of having other people in your life. It's a day of flowers, chocolate and cards decorated with hearts. This special day's origin, though, is not so rosy.



There are many theories on how Valentine's Day began, but the most noted one begins in Rome in the year 268. Emperor Claudius II wanted a fierce team of young men to fight in his armies. He found that when young men are in love or sharing their lives with a wife and children, they tended to be more cautious.

To ensure large numbers of soldiers for his armies, Claudius outlawed marriage for those young men.

Claudius may have outlawed love, but he could not stop it. Young men and women still fell in love and wanted to become couples in the eyes of the church. A brave—and obviously romantic—priest named Valentine thought the law was horribly unjust.

Putting his life in danger, Valentine continued performing marriage ceremonies, doing so in secret and hidden from the eyes of authorities.

Still, word of Valentine's secret ceremonies made its way back to Claudius. The priest was found and put to death, as some versions state, on February 14th. Centuries later, the Catholic Church made that kindly priest a saint, one of three saints named "Valentine."

No one knows exactly when St. Valentine's Day was first celebrated, but there is a poem in existence that is considered to be the first ever written Valentine's Day card. It was sent from a prisoner in the Tower of London to his wife in the year 1415.

Today, greeting card companies estimate that over a billion cards of love and affection are sent each St. Valentine's Day.

While Valentine is a Catholic Christian saint, his death and the tradition of love that he created is celebrated world-wide by people of all religions. People send cards, flowers and chocolate in many countries around the world.

Some countries have banned St. Valentine's Day, but people in love show the courage of the doomed priest by celebrating the occasion. Repressive governments may confiscate all of the red roses available in the country. Still, no one can ever halt the flow of love and affection.

Today's click-and-post culture is tossing aside many old traditions and rules. Still, the history of Valentine's Day lives on annually every February 14th in a worldwide celebration of love.

Happy St. Valentine's Day. Tell everyone in your heart how much they mean to you. And remember when you sign those cards how love and friendship lives on, even in the face of adversity.
